



COMMITTEE REPORTS



Highlights of the April 12 Meeting

- Council approved the Finance Committee to be the managing function of the Endowment Fund.
- Council sanctioned the actions of the finance committee in managing the various CD's and other funds. The first item was to agree with taking the CD (over \$60K) earning 0.25% at Unity Bank and moving it to Abbey Credit Union, where it will earn over 2%.
- Council voted to move the Church picnic, on August 28th, from West Milton to "the round building" in the Tipp City Park, down from the Church. Phil and Boots Elliot put the deposit down and are donating that (generously) to the Church.

- The decision was made to get an up to date quote on repairing the west wall and adjoining roof line. The last quote was \$15K, but is over 90 days old. Once receiving the new quote, a congregational meeting will be called to vote on approval of the the funds, which will be taken from the Endowment Fund.
- Council has authorized Jeff Slyman to begin negotiating a contract with the attorneys for the Tipp City Enrichment Program.
- The meeting was closed with The Lord's Prayer, as always.

WORSHIP & MUSIC COMMITTEE MINUTES April 6, 2016

Attending were: Marianne Barnhart, Bill Jones, Deb Keppel, Lori Sebastian, and Ruth White.

Ruth White opened the meeting in prayer. Lori thanked everyone for the Easter music. All Holy Week services went well. Some suggestions for future years: consider gathering in the narthex (and not entering the sanctuary prior to the service) Palm Sunday. Also, possibly bringing back the hyacinths and tulips so there was variety with the lilies. Liturgical changes were made for Easter season. Alleluias and the This is the Feast were added; and pre and post-communion canticles were adjusted. We will return to Setting 10 for summer (beginning Sunday May 29th) and likely return to Setting 3 or 4 for the fall.

Special services: We plan to have the kids sing for Mothers' Day. We discussed having some kind of flower for all mothers on Mothers' Day. Deb and Ruth were going to follow-up. Pentecost will be Sunday, May 15th; Holy Trinity will be Sunday, May 22nd.

Bill discussed the upcoming choir music. He's picked a wide variety of anthems, and has 4 pieces scheduled for Choir Sunday (also Pentecost) on May 15th. Ruth added the choir breakfast would be at 9AM on Choir Sunday in the Fellowship Hall. All choir members and their families are welcome! Bill has picked choir music for the rest of the choir season. All hymns and service music have also been selected.

The Worship and Music Committee will ask the Light Readers to present their program on Sunday, July 10th. Several options for special music for the summer 2016 were discussed. We plan to ask current members, kids, former members, and some creative partnering. Lori discussed the status of the organ fund. The fund balance as of Jan. 31st is \$4,315. This includes the money donated from the January Gifts of Zion concert. The amount needed for a new organ depends on whether we consider the purchase of a used or new organ. We also mentioned the new microphones incorporated into the existing sound system have been working well and are pleased with the sound quality during the worship services. PROPERTY COMMITTEE Monday, April 4

Members present: Garry Yunker, Bob Keppel, Dennis Copeland, Jeff Mitchell, Matt Sauls, John Greer, Brent Reedstrom Items Discussed :

- The committee welcomed Matt Sauls . James Sebastian will also be joining the committee.
- Committee members need to review procedure for doing the monthly elevator checks with the committee's new members, Matt Sauls and James Sebastian.
- Batteries in the exit lights and the Fellowship Hall back-up lights need to be replaced.
- A toilet in the women's restroom near the Fellowship Hall has developed a leak which is proving difficult to repair.
- After this week's strong winds, more shingles are missing from the ridge top vent. The decorative cap is missing and

while water may not be coming in, it will need to be repaired when the weather improves.

- A couple of downspouts are either clogged with debris or are too small for the volume of rain flow. When the roof work is scheduled, we will have the contractors look into this.
- The soffit and facia board on the west side of the portico needs to be lengthened. Currently these pieces are too short to withstand high winds.
- Starting in May, Matt Sauls will be responsible for the Thursday evening walk-through of the building. For the time being, committee members will take turns with the Saturday evening walk-through. Bob Keppel – April 9; John Greer – April 16, Jeff Mitchell – April 23, Garry Yunker – April 30.
- No report on the pew laminate replacement from Chris Bayman.
- No one has volunteered to take on the grant writing project for procuring funds for restoring our aging building.
- The fence dividing the church lawn west of the building and the properties on Main St. needs to be replaced.
- The grounds Work Day is scheduled for April 30 with a rain date of May 7.
 A group of boy scouts will be assisting us that day.
- An HVAC check-up will be scheduled with Rieck.
- The boiler was overheating on March 29 with temperatures reaching 88 degrees. Rieck was called to service and adjustment was made. However, on Sunday, April 3, the thermostat was not registering the actual temperature.
- The parking lot lights should be adjusted for summer hours.

The following chores were completed :

- monthly elevator check
- replaced batteries in emergency exits signs and emergency lights
- ballasts and bulbs were replaced in the kitchen
