INTRODUCTION

The fourth of the Old Testament promises providing a baptismal lens this Lent is the promise God makes to Moses: those who look on the bronze serpent will live. In today's gospel Jesus says he will be lifted up on the cross like the serpent, so that those who look to him in faith will live. When we receive the sign of the cross in baptism, that cross becomes the sign we can look to in faith for healing, for restored relationship to God, for hope when we are dying.

SECOND READING: Ephesians 2:1-10 Reader: Bob Keppel

R: ¹You were dead through the trespasses and sins ²in which you once lived, following the course of this world, following the ruler of the power of the air, the spirit that is now at work among those who are disobedient. ³All of us once lived among them in the passions of our flesh, following the desires of flesh and senses, and we were by nature children of wrath, like everyone else.

⁴But God, who is rich in mercy, out of the great love with which he loved us ⁵ even when we were dead through our trespasses, made us alive together with Christ—by grace you have been saved—⁶ and raised us up with him and seated us with him in the heavenly places in Christ Jesus, ⁷ so that in the ages to come he might show the immeasurable riches of his grace in kindness toward us in Christ Jesus. ⁸ For by grace you have been saved through faith, and this is not your own doing; it is the gift of God—⁹ not the result of works, so that no one may boast. ¹⁰ For we are what he has made us, created in Christ Jesus for good works, which God prepared beforehand to be our way of life.

CELTIC MUSIC by Lori Sebastian

With St. Patrick's Day in March, I pulled out some Celtic music books. I am not a Western European scholar, so when I considered what Celtic music referenced, I thought primarily Irish music. However, upon further research, I learned historically Celts occupied a good bit of Western Europe. Modern day when we think of Celts, it refers to 6 specific regions: Ireland, Scotland, Wales, and 3 other areas: Cornwall (a ceremonial county in England), Brittany (a western peninsula in France), and the Isle of Man (which is in the Irish Sea).

The two pieces I am playing for service - Sunday, March 14 - are Celtic. The prelude is an Irish tune: Slane (Be Thou My Vision – ELW 793 or Lord of All Hopefulness – ELW 765). The postlude is a Scottish tune: Candler. Initially, Scottish poet Robert Burns wrote text "Ye Banks and Braes of Bonnie Doon" that was set to this specified Scottish tune. Later the text Come, O Thou Traveler Unknown, written by Charles Wesley, was set to the Candler tune. Wesley's poem titled Wrestling Jacob contains 14 stanzas that are 6 lines each. It describes Jacob wrestling with an angel at Peniel, in which he receives his new name: Israel. For those interested in the full text, check this link: https://hymnary.org/hymn/UMH/387 While the Celtic hymn tune Candler does not appear in our Lutheran hymnals, I wondered how many Irish, Scottish and Welsh tunes or lyrics are in our hymnal? More than I expected! Due to time and space, I decided to focus primarily on the Scottish and Welsh lyrics and tunes.

The first Welsh hymn tune I discovered was CWM Rhondda – named for the Rhondda Valley in Wales. It was a tune written by Welsh composer John Hughes in 1907. We know it by the words: *God of Grace, and God of Glory* (ELW 705), but it also

appears with 2 other texts in Evangelical Lutheran Worship (ELW). Another Welsh traditional hymn tune is Ar Hyd Nos (*All Through the Night*). It appears in Evangelical Lutheran Worship 3 times with various texts although one common text includes *Go, My Children, with My Blessing* - ELW 543. Another Welsh hymn tune is Llangloffan (*Bless Now, O God, the Journey* - ELW 326 or *O God of Every Nation* - ELW 713). One of my personal favorites would be the Welsh tune: The Ash Grove (*Sent Forth by God's Blessings* - ELW 547 or *Let All Things Now Living* - ELW 881). An extremely common Welsh ballad is St. Denio (*Immortal, Invisible, God Only Wise* - ELW 834), with lyrics written by Scottish minister Walter Chalmers Smith. This transitions us nicely into our Scottish hymn tunes and texts.

The Lord's My Shepherd (based on the 23rd Psalm) first appeared in the Scottish Psalter in 1650 with text attributed to English Puritan Francis Rous. There are two Scottish tunes to which it is sung: Crimond by Jessie Seymour Irvine and Brother James Air by James Leith Macbeth Bain. As ELW 778, The Lord's My Shepherd is set to the tune Brother James Air. Written by Scottish minister John Bell, a more contemporary Scottish text appears in ELW 798 Will You Come and Follow Me? That text (The Summons) also has a traditional Scottish tune: Kelvingrove. Did you know that the popular Scottish hymn tune Bunessan – often recalled by the text Morning Has Broken (ELW 556) was first a Christmas carol titled Child in the Manger? In addition, Scottish tune Dundee appears in our hymnal twice (ELW 758 – You Are the Way or ELW 863 - My God How Wonderful Thou Art.) One other familiar hymn text to Dundee is God Moves in a Mysterious Way. Given we are in the Lenten season, perhaps some would be surprised to learn that Scottish born Anglican Henry Francis Lyte penned Abide with Me – ELW 629; Lyte also penned Praise My Soul the King of Heaven – ELW 865.

Although Lutheran hymnody draws many hymns from German, English (British), and American roots, it was well to learn we have 2-3 dozen Celtic hymns in our hymnal. Several months ago, I played a piece by Sherri Hansen titled "In Christ there is No East or West", and she featured several musical styles to illustrate: Japanese, Chinese, Filipino, and American. It would be interesting for a composer to write another version of this tune incorporating Celtic, Eastern European, Asian, and African tunes.
