Life, Death and Faith

Pastor and author Tim Keller wrote a very honest piece for *The Atlantic* magazine in 2021 after receiving his diagnosis of pancreatic cancer. He begins by saying, *"I have spent a good part of my life talking with people about the role of faith in the face of imminent death. Since I became an ordained Presbyterian minister in 1975, I have sat at countless bedsides, and occasionally even watched someone take their final breath. I recently wrote book, relating what I say to people in such times. But when, a little more than a month after that book was published, I was diagnosed with pancreatic cancer, I was still caught unprepared." He goes on to talk about how despite being 70 years old and knowing that one day he would die, when he and his wife were confronted with his impending death their first questions was "what is God doing to us?" Pastor Keller said his first instinct was to question God and the questioning was accompanied by a strong sense of denial of his mortality. He said the more he thought about his death the more he realized that if death was to become real, then his beliefs in God would have to be just as real. He said, and I quote, <i>"Theoretical ideas about God's love and the future resurrection had to become life-gripping truths, or to be discarded as useless".*

The Easter season invites us into the miracle, the struggle and the mystery of Christ's life and death and therefore our life and death. The first and only message of Easter is Christ has died, Christ is risen, Christ will come again, but because Christ lives - when we die - we too shall live. Easter despite all the bunnies and colorful eggs is extremely theological – meaning we learn a great deal about God as well as how God works in the world from Easter. But not only is Easter extremely theological it is also extremely confrontational. When we are confronted with the reality of life and death what we believe about our own life and death shows us the basis of our entire faith. Everything we know, believe, trust, and do regarding God revolves around whether or not we believe and trust in the story of Easter. If the resurrection is nothing more than a "tale" we tell ourselves, then the entire message of Christianity is a lie and this world as we know it is as good as it gets. If there is nothing beyond this life, if death is truly the last word - then we have no hope of a world restored and a life to come. But if we believe - then we are able to join Paul and say when death comes – "Thank the Lord I am going home to be with God". However, if death is what we believe has the last word - and if we have no hope of life after death - then as Paul also says we really are people to be most pitied.


Upcoming Events






Jason Address Correction

Zion Lutheran Church is turning 200 in 2026

March 3,1826 was the date that our church was planted in Tipp City. The Bicentennial of Zion is a major milestone and we want to celebrate accordingly. The Council wants to put together a planning committee of approximately six people to plan multiple celebrations. Zion History Part 2

The first pastor came as a result of petitioning the New York Synod of the Reformed Church. His name was John Pantz. Pastor Pantz reportedly was a man of many talents. He pastored the little flock, taught the three R's to the children and did some "doctoring". During his stay he also rode horseback to minister to folks in the surrounding area. No doubt an educated and cultured man. A rarity in western Ohio at that time. Pastor Pantz stayed with and nourished our church until 1839. His devoted leadership no doubt is majorly responsible for the survival of our church in its infancy.

Sometime about 1840 The German Reformed members and the Lutherans decided to part. The Lutherans supposedly being too "liberal" for the Reformed folks to continue their association. A Lutheran congregation was organized from the members of the original church and they continued to worship at the little log church on south Hyatt Street under the name of the Worman Church, named in honor of the gentleman who originally deeded the land to the church. It is not known where our Reformed friends finally settled.

In the formation of the new all Lutheran group a lay pastor was called. His name was A.S. Link (1839-1848). During his tenure at the Worman Church, Pastor Link also served three other congregations; the Bethel Church in Clark County, the Stillwater Church near Vandalia and the Casstown Church. He preached in both German and English. Like many churches of that time, ours was one congregation in a parish of four under the care of one pastor. In 1878, our church finally became a singular parish. Pastor Link was given the recognition of ordination by the Joint Ohio Synod in 1842. Pastor Link played an important role in the early history of our church in that he strengthened the doctrine of Lutheranism in this area and consolidated our congregation as Lutherans.

At the urging of Pastor Link and the lay leaders of the old Worman Church, a new building site was acquired on February 6, 1847. Namely lot number 30 of the new town plat of Tippecanoe, the same lot where our present church is located. The lot was then at the very western edge of town and still in the woods. It was deeded by John Clark, the town's founder, to the trustees of the newly named Evangelical Lutheran Church; John Ritter, Jacob Rohrer and John Sanders. John Ritter, a successful farmer, donated two thousand dollars toward the building of the new church. It is reported the total cost of the structure was slightly over thirty-two hundred dollars. The old log Worman Church was abandoned and left to ruin, but the deeded property and cemetery remained, as it does to this day, in the ownership and care of our church.

Communications / Welcoming Committee Report

- Pastor Sally reported that Kristen Zimmann made several visits to our shut-ins during the past month. The Pastoral Care Team takes communion to Zion members who cannot attend services.
- Several members of our committee will be assembling photo directories in April for those who don't have one. In the future, pictures of members will be included on the church roster pages.
- Weather permitting, Zion will have a popcorn and water booth on the front lawn during the Solar Eclipse Block Party on Saturday, April 6 from 10:00 2:00.
- Jessica Dorn is organizing the Palm Sunday brunch and Easter Egg hunt.
- The committee is planning a couple of events such as a pizza lunch and bowling at Tipp City Pizza after church sometime in April, possibly a BUNCO night after a Saturday evening service and a Zion night at Dayton Dragons game in August.

We reviewed upcoming Lent, Holy Week, and Easter dates.

- A. Devotional Service March 6th 6pm
- B. Palm Sunday Saturday/Sunday March 23 5pm / March 24 10am
- C. Maundy Thursday March 28 7pm
- D. Good Friday March 29 7pm
- E. Easter March 30 (Saturday Vigil) 5pm; March 31 Sunday 10am

Zion will host special musicians. Adena Brass (Linda Holt) will be providing music for worship on Sunday, April 28. We will also begin looking for summer special musicians.

Bill Jones and Susie Gray gave vocal choir updates. We continue learning additional songs from All Creation Sings. Bill has the schedule set through Easter. Bill also mentioned pieces will be sung for Palm Sunday and Easter that were purchased in memory of Mike Werts. We also discussed a Raney arrangement of Christ the Lord is Risen Today, which is intended for a prelude and choir/congregation procession.

Lori stated bells will ring on Sunday, April 7th (This is the Sunday after Easter). Bells could also ring again in early May or mid-June depending on availability.

Carla Frame provided updates for altar. She has ordered more communion supplies, and they are working on finding another intinction set which is easier to utilize.

The committee reviewed liturgy and service. We will continue to utilize the Kyrie, Hymn of Praise, and Communion liturgy including the Sanctus and the Agnus Dei. At Easter, we will return Alleluias and switch to This is the Feast, add in the post communion canticle Thank the Lord, and utilize a new offertory canticle – tune Barbara Allen – ELW 691 – Accept O Lord, the Gifts We Bring. We will likely switch liturgies (Setting 2) this summer and use these canticles (offertory response): Take My Life and Let it Be – ELW 583 and Let Us Talents and Tongues Employ – ELW 674. Lori is working on keying hymns and service music from January to March into One License.

Pastor Sally gave her updates. She appreciates the warm welcome everyone has given her.

The technology committee continues working in the sanctuary. At this time, the sound in the choir loft is on hold due to feedback issues. However, the team has installed a new camera to aid remote worship. In addition, thanks to Jessica Dorn who created a slide with Zion information, which is now displayed on every video, in case people watching wish to attend in person.


