#### **God Given Gifts**

Do not be conformed to this age, but be transformed by the renewing of the mind, so that you may discern what is the will of God—what is good and acceptable and perfect. For as in one body we have many members, and not all the members have the same function, so we, who are many, are one body in Christ, and individually we are members one of another. We have gifts that differ according to the grace given to us.

Romans 12:2,4-6a

Rodney had been coming to worship for two years. He never said much, he would come sit in the back and leave right after worship. No one in the congregation thought much of it, because we all knew Rodney was poor and had some mental and emotional challenges. One Sunday morning I announced that one of our partner churches needed help with their food pantry and to everyone's surprise Rodney was the first to volunteer. The next evening, Rodney, myself and three other members from the church went and worked for three hours - putting out food, helping people to the car, and helping people to shop. Rodney worked hard doing everything he was told to do. On the drive home Rodney asked, "When will we be going back"? Those six words were the most I had ever heard him say at one time. Those six words were also the beginning of an amazing transformation. For the next three years, on the third Monday of each month, Rodney was ready and waiting for me to pick him up to go volunteer at the food pantry. Each month he began to open up a little bit more and each month his participation at our church grew as well. Within a year Rodney was getting to church at 7:30 every Sunday morning. He would put out the coffee and pastries that were a part of our Sunday morning breakfast. After breakfast was over, he would go upstairs and get the communion ready for worship. When it was time, he would light the altar candles. After worship, he was back downstairs to help clean up from breakfast. Over time, Rodney stopped sitting in the back of the sanctuary and began sitting in the second row. He prayed out loud during prayer time and sang fervently for the Lord. Being able to use the gifts God had given him, transformed Rodney in a way none of us could explain, but the transformation did not stop with Rodney. The congregation was also transformed as they learned the importance of allowing everyone to use their gifts. Everyone – and I mean everyone - has been gifted by God. Young, old, rich, poor, black, brown, white, able bodied, physically challenged, emotionally challenged or of sound mind - Everyone has gifts given to them by God and each of us are called to use those gifts. Take a minute and ask yourself, how are you using your gifts? I want to encourage everyone to use their gifts as part of the body of Christ and if you see gifts in others, encourage them as a friend to use their gifts for the glory of God. Pastor Sally

Each team is asked to have at least one member on the track at all times. Teams also set up booths where they give out food, crafts, and other items for donations. Some teams also have games or other activities.


All cancer survivors are invited to the Survivor Luncheon at 11:30 am. Each survivor may bring one quest to the lunch. Survivors who are pre-registered will receive a gift bag.

A DJ provides music throughout the day. There are activities such as a frozen t-shirt contest, a Miss Relay contest (guys dress up like girls and walk around getting donations), and more. You may bring your dog with you as long as the dog is on a leash, and you clean up after them.

As it begins to get dark, all the luminaries are lit. Each luminaria is dedicated in memory of someone who had cancer, in honor of a cancer survivor, or in support of someone who is battling cancer. Then at 9 pm we have the Luminaria Ceremony which includes the reading More Cancer

of all the names. The day ends with the Closing Ceremony. Then everyone is asked to walk one final lap, the first lap of 2025.

## **Call Committee Update**

Beginning in spring 2022, the Call Committee was formed. Since that time, we have interviewed 12 candidates. At this writing, we are beginning the call process for the 13<sup>th</sup> candidate. I had a conversation with Pastor Bob Abrams, Assistant to Bishop Suzanne Dillahunt. He assured me that Zion does not have any glaring flaws that would make a candidate not want to be our pastor. He said that there is a national problem: There are not enough seminary graduates. Some candidates want to be closer to family, some want to be in an urban setting, some have felt that we are not the right fit for them. We have been fortunate in having many candidates to interview. And we are so thankful that we've had Pastor Dale and now Pastor Sally to be our interims. So, we are continuing our search. God will send the right one to us in His time. We ask that you continue to pray for Zion, Council and the Call Committee.

#### We Need Bicentennial Celebration Planners

March 3,1826 was the date that our church was planted in Tipp City. The Bicentennial of Zion is a major milestone and we want to celebrate accordingly. The Council wants to put together a planning committee of approximately six people to plan multiple celebrations. ## **Zion History Part 3**

The corner stone for the new church was laid on July 16, 1847. Dr. Ezra Keller, the first president of Wittenberg University, preached in English followed by the Reverend G.H. Reimsneider who preached in German. (Reimsneider was a brother of Pastor Link's wife.) This new church, was the talk of the county! A magnificent structure for its time and place. Brick of local manufacture was used in its construction, and no cost was spared in the quality and beauty of the building. How proud our forebears must have been! What a change they witnessed! From a humble log hut to magnificent brick church in the space of only twenty-one years. These were dedicated Lutherans.

It is well at this time to mention John Ritter once more. Without his generosity and dedication to his church, the 1847 building might never have been constructed. Further, upon his death on November 11, 1862, he bequeathed a lot on the corner of Main and Third Streets and two thousand dollars for the purpose of building a parsonage. The parsonage was built and there it stood until 1920.

Pastor Link took his leave of our church in 1848 to answer a call in Lancaster, Ohio. He was followed by Pastors Aughe, Harris and Schauer, but returned as our Pastor in June of 1861. He served here until his death on March 30, 1862. Pastor Link was only forty-two. He was well known and respected in this area. As a result, his funeral was so well attended it had to be held in the Methodist Church, as it was the largest building available at the time.

Sometime during the period of 1847 and 1850, our church began to be known as the English Lutheran Church. We suspect because it had become fashionable to forsake one's old country language and speak only English. However, some adhering to the custom of the "hard headed German" formed the German Lutheran Church and were permitted to meet in the English Church. This happy and peaceful arrangement continued until 1878 when the German faction constructed their own church on the corner of Third and South streets. This congregation went out of existence in 1917. It is suspected the anti-German feelings of the First World War had something to do with their demise. A number of the German members drifted back to our congregation in the ensuing years. The old German Church still stands in a much-remodeled condition at Third and South Streets, and has been utilized by several denominations through the years.


### Vacation Bible School (VBS) Update

#### Suo Gan

A Welsh composer wrote the tune Suo Gan during the early 1800s. While no one knows the name of the composer, Welsh poet Robert Bryan penned a lullaby that was set to the tune, and then the tune became more well known. Interestingly, the name Suo Gan literally means "lullaby." The choir sang this tune multiple times this past year. The congregation sang the tune in December and in March.

Suo Gan appears in our Evangelical Lutheran Worship twice. Once in Advent - "Now the Heavens Start to Whisper" (901) and once in Lent – "As the Winter Days Grow Longer" (924). There is also a third newer Easter text "Christ Has Risen While Earth Slumbers" (938) that also fits well with this tune.

The Easter text "Christ Has Risen While Earth Slumbers"

- Christ has risen while earth slumbers, Christ has risen where hope died, As he said and as he promised, As we doubted and denied. Let the moon embrace the blessing; Let the sun sustain the cheer; Let the world confirm the rumor: Christ is risen, God is here!
- 2. Christ has risen for the people
  Whom he died to love and save;
  Christ has risen for the women
  Bringing flowers to grace his grave.
  Christ has risen for disciples
  Huddled in an upstairs room.
  He whose word inspired creation
  Can't be silenced by the tomb.
- 3. Christ has risen to companion
  Former friends who fear the night,
  Sensing loss and limitation
  Where their faith had once burned bright.
  They bemoan what is no longer,
  They expect no hopeful sign
  Till Christ ends their conversation,
  Breaking bread and sharing wine.
- 4. Christ has risen and for ever Lives to challenge and to change All whose lives are messed or mangled, All who find religion strange. Christ is risen, Christ is present Making us what he has been: Evidence of transformation In which God is known and seen.

## **Needy Basket Partnership with Meijer**
